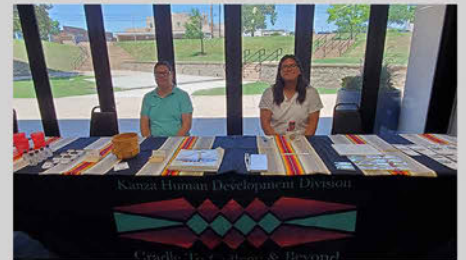
2022 Kaw Nation Program Fair

Several Kaw Nation service departments gathered at City Central in Ponca City on June 29th to kick off this year's 2022 Program Fair. The purpose of this event is to educate the community regarding all of the services and programs that are made available by Kaw Nation. Departments in attendance included Injury Prevention, Diabetic Program, Human Development/Education, Child Care,

Veteran Services, and many more. Snacks, merchandise, and door prizes were provided by Kaw Nation.

Visitors were also able to obtain educational materials as well as speak with department representatives directly. This year's Program Fair proved to be an incredible resource to the community and gained much exposure to those in need of the many services and programs that we offer.

We look forward to further increasing community awareness and hosting this event as often as possible moving forward.



Attention Kaw Nation Citizen-Owned Small Businesses

The Kaw Nation tribal council has developed a Small Business Grant Program for Kaw Nation citizen-owned small businesses and farm/ranch operations that have been active since 2019 or before. This grant is in the amount of \$20,000 or 10% of annual revenue for 2019. Applications may be downloaded from the website and mailed to Kaw Nation, PO Box 50, Kaw City, OK, 74641 in the attention of Steven Landsberry. All applications will be sent to a third party for review and recommendation. Applications must be complete. Eligibility: Must be at least 51% owner of a private, for-profit business with less than 500 employees that was in operation in 2019 or earlier. Applicant must also be an enrolled member of Kaw Nation.

Dental Department Gives Children Smiles

Directed by the Indian Health Service, the Kanza Dental Clinic was chosen to collaborate with the nationwide company Henry Schein, for the “Give Kids A Smile” initiative. The local “Give Kids A Smile” event was held at the Kaw Nation Child Care Development Center on May 25th, 2022.



The aim of “Give Kids A Smile” was to directly screen the children for dental conditions, deliver fluoride therapy, and educate kids about dental hygiene all in hopes of reducing the dental diseases in children of all ages. With the help of Lesley, a regional director from Henry Schein, the dental clinic was provided all the necessary tools to make this initiative succeed.

The direct services provided to the children included dental screenings and fluoride applications. Educational pamphlets and oral hygiene kits were also sent to the homes of children to aid in dental hygiene habits at home.

Her fellowship allows her to spend nine months as an independent researcher at the Delft University of Technology. Through hydrodynamic modeling, she hopes to demonstrate the importance of tidal marsh restoration in flood risk mitigation. 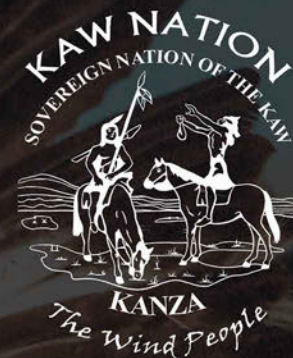

Chilocco Monument Provides Name Recognition

As the result of Federal defunding in the 1980's, the native boarding school commonly known as Chilocco Indian Agricultural School was forced to discontinue educational programs that had celebrated graduates going back to 1894.

While the majority of the buildings and facilities have since become battered remnants of what they once were, some aspects of this formerly thriving campus are continually maintained. Amongst these are the Chilocco Cemetery where the unmarked graves of students who passed more than a century ago reside. Finding the cemetery requires a guide or detailed instructions, as much of the area is overgrown. Upon arriving, however, one will find the cemetery well-kept and cared for. Surrounded by metal fencing that connects at an entrance gate, the site

has an aura of importance and appreciation upon arrival.

Until recently, the nameless sites within the grounds might leave visitors with a fragmented feeling of wanting to know more about those that rest there. With painstaking collective research done by alumni along with funding from a Kaw Nation grant, a new monument has

been dedicated to the Chilocco Cemetery. Standing over 7 feet tall, this monument respectfully provides the names and tribal information that the gravestones lack.



Kaw Nation 2022 Election Information

Citizens of the Kaw nation are hereby notified that an election will be held September 11, 2022 for the purpose of filling the following positions: **Chair, Tribal Council Secretary, Tribal Council Member #1 and Tribal Council Member #3.**

The Election is conducted in accordance with Article IX, pursuant to Section 4 of the Constitution of the Kaw Nation ratified on August 20th, 2011, and as amended on April 29, 2016.

Voter Qualifications:

A qualified voter must be an enrolled citizen of the Kaw Nation, be 18 years of age or older on the date of the election, and not have been adjudged mentally incompetent by a court of competent jurisdiction.



Absentee Voting

The last day that a written request for an absentee ballot can be received by the Election Board is August 12, 2022. Voter may request an Absentee Ballot from the Election Board. Please send written requests to:

Upon receipt of written request containing the voter's signature, the Election Board shall mail in an absentee ballot to the requester. Absentee ballots must be returned in the pre-addressed mailing envelopes provided with the ballot. Ballots must be returned by postal mail to the above address, no later than September 10, 2022. No ballots will be accepted in person or at any other location.

Election Results:

Immediately following the tabulation of the ballots, the Election Board shall issue an unofficial canvass of the Election results. The Election Board shall issue the Certified Election Results after the expiration of

the protest period at 12:00pm on September 14, 2022 or after the resolution of any challenges received by the Election Board, whichever is later. Election results will be posted at the appropriate Tribal Offices as well as being released to all appropriate media outlets at the conclusion of the election.
