Here at Kaw Nation, we have been busy with several ongoing projects that Lonnie has included in this newsletter. Land Management Department has been keeping busy! Between their projects of cutting firewood, and fencing, they have begun clearing out the flowerbed in front of the museum. Once it is all cleared out, the kids from the Daycare will come and plant some pretty flowers and herbs for Title VI to use in the foods they serve. Two sets of three flag poles have been purchased. One set will be placed at headquarters, in front of the administration building and the other set will be placed at the Washunga Cemetery. KHDD will be putting on two summer camps in June for their JOM youth at the powwow grounds. The Tribal Council will soon be visiting a couple of greenhouses to see what the best fit for Kaw Nation will be, for the future plan of greenhouses. There has been discussion on using the OneStop facility in Kaw City, as a distribution center for the foods and plants grown at the greenhouses and putting the laundromat back in for business. The cabins are now being rented out and spots are now available at our Eagle Nest RV Park in Kaw City. This annual gathering has become an increasingly familiar destination for the team under the leadership of Director Storm Brave, as they have consistently seen success competing at ONAYLF.

This year marked yet another milestone for Team Tajé Sage, with over 22 competitors clinching medals across multiple categories and over 1400 competitors. Their outstanding performance included an impressive trophy tally of 12 first-place, 6 second-place, and 4 third-place finishes, along with 2 honorable mentions. Such recognition not only brings honor to our community, but it also showcases the team's exceptional dedication to language preservation.

Kaw Nation's continual presence and success at ONAYLF underscores the importance of indigenous language in modern society and hopes to inspire more tribal citizens to participate in upholding our linguistic traditions.

Kaw City Acquisitions and Demolitions

As Kaw Nation continues to expand its property holdings in Kaw City, various departments and contractors have been diligently enhancing these assets to better align with our requirements. In a

recent acquisition of the property just west of our office complex on Grandview Drive, we successfully demolished a deteriorated shed and its contents, resulting in a significantly improved and aesthetically pleasing environment. Further along Grandview Drive, the property formerly known as One Stop, now owned by Kaw Nation, presents another opportunity for development. While the building itself holds promise for the Tribe, we have removed outdated gas pumps and in-ground tanks to pave the way for Kaw Nation's future plans for the site.

CONTROLLED BURNS KEEP WASHUNGA BAY SAFE AND VIBRANT

Kaw Nation Land Management and Maintenance crews recently collaborated to execute a controlled burn in Washunga Bay. Initiating from Kaw Nation property on East Ferguson Road, the burn covered over 100 acres extending westward to the shoreline of Kaw Lake near the bridge leading to the Washunga Bay campgrounds. Controlled burns serve as an effective method for wildfire risk reduction while simultaneously facilitating habitat restoration by eliminating dead vegetation and enriching the soil with nutrients. The project was meticulously planned and executed, involving crews stationed across various areas and multiple

firetrucks on standby. Additionally, coordination efforts were undertaken with the Army Corps of Engineers and local landowners to safeguard and preserve Kaw Nation lands, as well as other areas within the community.



KNPD ENSURING COMMUNITY SAFETY



Ensuring the safety and security of the community is paramount for the Kaw Nation Police Department, and recent qualification testing at the KNPD firing range in Kaw City underscores this commitment. Adhering to stringent CLEET standards, officers honed their skills with handguns, shotguns, and rifles, reaffirming their proficiency in handling crucial firearms. Beyond mere compliance, these qualifications signify a dedication to maintaining peak performance levels essential for safeguarding the community effectively. Hailing from Kaw City, Jesse has nurtured a deep bond with the Kaw Nation community and was eager to contribute to the Kaá'ze Íe programs through his involvement in the Chickasaw Leadership Academy. His passion for language stems from his 13-year tenure as a linguist in the Army. The ceremonial presentation of the donation took place at the First Americans Museum in Oklahoma City, where documentary camera crews were capturing the event. In recognition of his service and longstanding support for the language department, Jesse was honored with a stunning Pendleton wool blanket. The occasion also provided an opportunity to discuss future collaborative endeavors between Jesse and the Kaw Nation Language department.

Lee & Company as they carry out their tasks in the vicinity. Together, let's embrace this milestone achievement, which not only addresses the digital gap but also strengthens our community's connectivity and opportunities for growth.
